Guidance

Look through the whole text again for three dangers – though you might be able to think of them yourself having read it once.

The first danger is obvious because some urban exploration involves climbing high buildings, or edging along slippery masonry as the author is invited to do. Drowning is evidently possible because Garrett is concerned about water levels in the sewer after rainfall. Being arrested is less obvious, but is implied by 'recreational trespass', 'a familiarity with the laws of access' (paragraph 1) and by the author's nervousness when there are people around who might accuse him of trespassing.

Marking

There are 3 marks available – 1 mark for each danger. Any sensible answers based on the information in the text will be accepted for the marks.

Top Tip

In this question, the word 'danger' refers to something unwelcome or unpleasant that could happen, so you don't need to limit your answers to harm or injury (although these are possibilities). Keep your answers brief: you are not asked to explain.
